Gold mines I gathered
a nice handful of
strawberries while
Father was fixing

Pabli's ranch

July 25th Thursday

Remained in camp
while Father & his 3
hands went to work
the road through the
Cannon this passed
the great celebration
day

July 26th Friday

Still in camp to
wait a miners meeting
tomorrow

July 27th Saturday

The miners came
but no meeting
because Mr. Marshall
did not come

July 7th Sunday
 drove back out of
 the canyon & camped 12
 on Comarone seat
 where we left Mr
 M^e carry the Ute

 on the next break

to put us over &
by 9 o'clock we
were all over but
the 4 men who
refused to stand
guard of night 2
of the men went
off yesterday
therefore they did

not cross that
leaves the family
& Wm Snodice
we leave the rio
grande at 3 o'clock
we crossed the
bottom land of
the rio grande
& then we begin
ascend the sand
hills after we get
to the top we
rested our horses
on some very good
grass we then
hitched up & gave
our horses a little
water out of the
keg that we had
brought along.

for that purpose
 we then started on
 further got in the
 wagon to rest &
 sleep so as when
 we got stopped he
 would watch the
 horses while he
 was asleep Billy
 took the wrong
 road the truck
 run out & had
 to stop until
 daylight & we
 found that were
 going straight east
 rested our horses
 on poor grass went
 8 or 9 miles out of our
 way straight through 14 miles

Left Indiana April 8th 1867
 arrived in Prescott
 Oct 9th 1867 the day mother was 3 yrs. old, and
 camped at the red rocks. Mother born Oct 9, 1864.
