We at last got under way, but on acct o unbroken teams, ig drivers  
nd deserts it was sev days bf we got in rkg order. Soti the whole  
night guard, with their outfits, would decamp in a body, leavg the catl  
to wander ofer the ct. The deserters er replaced by betr men obt fm  
retg trains, w ch we sent back r sick.

After some days of trib we cr the vs oth Big and L Grasshopper,  
nd reached Walnut Creek on the 8th of July. Here we saw r first deer,  
On the night of the 17th, when 120 mi on the road, we had the most  
terr t under-storm I ever saw. I was out all night herding the catl, nd  
the glare o lightning and crash of thunder rendered them hard to  
manage. They hardly lay down all night, but wandrd fitfully about,  
ch made it hard for us. . .

Our next day's camp was by the side oth new-made G of a  
teamster, who had bn run over by a stampede of oxen. A mound marked th  
spot on r arr, but by mg the herd had so trampled down the wet earth  
that no trace was visible of the resting place oth poor fellow, even th  
rude headboards, on ch was his name, bg displaced.

On the 20th we c to Marysville, on the BB. Here was a mission  
and reserv oth Otto Is. While des the bluff one of r oxen died; but th  
noble red men, when apprised, soon had him skinned, cut up and c to  
their villg. These Is shaved their heads and were otherwise as near  
naked as they cd well be. . .

The v oth BB was swarmg w mosqs, and that n while herdg we er  
badly pestered w them. They bit through ur clothg and sang merrily  
at their work. We wrappd rss fm head to heels in r blankets to fence  
them off, tho th air was opp sultry, but in spite of that they bit us s  
we er cov w a rash the next mg. To their shrill tenor a band o wolves  
on the adj bluffs howled a blood-curdng baritone. The howl oth wolf  
is enough, but when a band of this species get down to their work, it i  
mo than that. They commence w a shrill whine, ch incrs nd deepends  
until it ends in an unearthly yell ch you feel in your bones.

We cr the Blue on a rope ferry, swimmg all the oxen except what  
we wanted to pull the wgs on to the boat. My fr Finlay and I er sent  
to herd catl on the other side oth rv, where we er kept till night w  
nothing to eat. When we er relieved, we had to swim the rv to r wgs  
ch er not ferried over. The rv was swollen, so that we landed far blow  
in the darkness. The next mg we fnd r shoes stolen awa sm of r clothg,  
che we had left on the other side.

After crossg the rest oth wgs, the guards er re-arrgd, nd r rifles  
nd a few rounds of ammun given us, as we er getg among hostil Ids. Ther  
er pistols also in the train arsenal, but for motives of policy they we  
not given out. Some of r men cd punish one another w fist and tooth  
suff wo using these. At noon on the 25th we met a part oth troops  
sent to Utah, retg. They er artillerymen, w sm cav or dragoons.. and  
Gen Harney, still living in 1888 was with them . .

We reached the va oth LB on the 26th June. This was full of mosqs,  
nd at night noisey w wolves. Thile herdg that nt, a wolf crosd a knoll  
within 20 yds of where I was lyg down, lookg in silhouette ag the clear  
sky to my excited fancy as lg as a horse.

Our rt lay the next day along the v oth LB om the direc PR. The  
rd was miry and lined w carcasses of dead oxen lost by precedg trains,  
ch f the air w sickening odors. We afterwards left the v and cr hi  
gr, fm ch we had a fine view of the lower ct to th south. Broad vis  
tas of verdure, traversed by belts of darker green, marked the timber  
lined streams. . .

The first of August found us among a range of sand hills whc ann r  
appr to the v oth Platte. These er a succ of knolls and ridges fm 30 t

to 60 feet hi. Amid their defiles r wheels sunk deep in the sand, nd we freq doubled teams in order to get through. Fm these we came to the broad, level bottom oth rv, ch was marked by num wooded island In the dist we saw FK, the low bldgs of ch er just visible above the pr. When within a mi the tr was stopped, nd orders givn f each man to overhaul his load, and put the flour ch was in any way damaged by rain in the bottom, so as the load d pass govtl inspec. We er forced to become parties to this fraud, whether lg or not. We enc at noon a few hundred yards beyond the Post.

26 Fort K is about 160 mi fm the Mo. It was estab durg the Mexican War, the intention bg to nnnect the frontiers w the Pacific by a chain of mil posts along the P and Columbia Rvs. The bldgs csisted of barracks, hospital, sutler store and vcav stables. So er of logs, others o frame, but the majority er of dried mud and roofed w sods. It was not a ver prepossessg place, but after a j o 300 mi through a wildern, we welcd the sight, as we d also did the sound oth bugle that night, and the roll o drum and the shriek of fife the next mg fm the musicians oth l gar

At K Finlay left me. Since the tr started he had been as sick of hi prof as the trad dog of th prov broth. He cd see no romance in holler ing at and beating oxen all day and herdg them on alt nights, and was dis gusted w his assoccs. Much as he disliked to leave me, he wasdet to quit the tr in some way. One dark and stormy night, when on guard near the sand hills, he came to camp and, awakeng me, tried to persuade me to deser with him and make r way through 300 mi of wildern to the Mo . . I did not start out w the int o turng back, nd prev on him to desist. . He was after wqrds taken sikk, and went back w the next return train. . .

24 We left FK the mg after r arr and slowly moved up the v oth P, whose waters er were to follow to the summit oth RMs. Our rt was ab a mile fm the shore, ch we er unable to appro nearer on acct of num ~~slopes~~ sloos, as the Pikers call marshy creeks, ch extend fm the rv. The wtr we cdn see f the many islands. Towards night we p a Fr tp, whose owenr had grown rich tradg w Es and Is. Oc, the item of whisky was the most attrac part of his stock. These traders gen had one or m I wives, by ch means they ingrat themss w the noble red men.

/2 We c six miles west oth F. The next mg we broke corral early, as r wgmster was anxious to make up for lost time. I never saw birds in freedom as tame as here. They d alight near us as we pasd along, nd it wa sport for the skilled Pikers to pop them w their whips - the crackers bg as fatal as bullets. But we er soon tosee larger game than birds. . B chase. . mtd on  $\frac{1}{2}$  l mulew, armed w rifles, revolvers nd knives w their heels, ch nearly dragd to the gr, bristling w huge rattlg spurs, our heroie lookd like Don Quixote and Sancho Panza, startg out on one o their wind mill stormg expeds. . /escape/ / another hunt/ unsucc/ lost, locked amid a maze of sandhills, surr by darkn and in danger ev moment o bg run over b the bands of B, ch er now on their way to water and fillg the air w their bellowg. . with Polar star as y guide I endeav to reach the north side oth range of shs. . found only by firing final cartridge/. .

27 One of r men, who was an old hunter, had shot a B out towards the s-hs, nd skd me to go w him to get some fresh beef f supper. As dark as it was, through a sort of instinct, he led the way straight to where the animal ~~was~~ lay. . Carvg a choice cut from his flesh, we lugged it to the camp, much to the delight of the thirty men who had lived on salt pork long enough toget the scurvy. Still we soon got tired of B meat, as it wa tough and had a strong musky odor, nd some oth men er made sick b the change.

The road was line w bands of B, and the whole plain bet the rv and s-hs was fairly black w them. We saw them not by hundreds or thousands, but by hundreds of acres. The main body was about a quartr of a mile from us, the colum near a mile in width, and extendg parallel with the river as far either way as the eye cd reach. Sev er grazg near the road nd some came close to r wgs, heedless of danger, nd er constant targets f r rifles. I shot one within 10 yards of the

- 28 wg. How many er k during the day I don't know; but far too many, & nd we at lost got disgusted w the mis sport nd put r rifles away. To be sure, my first adv w them was quite excitg , but now so quiet er they that there was no sport in firg at these harmless brutes. Numbers of them, k by parties in advance, er scatrd over the plain, half devoured by wolves; and the inroad made pon them by immigrants and hunters, er in thirty yrs to drive them out of existence, cep where protec. I am ashamed to think that we had ann part of this slaughter.

To show how near theoutlyg members oth large herd of Bs ch darkened the plain on the east came to r camp, I l mention that a half-grown specimen, jumped over one of r wagon tongues, on its road to water. Its temerity was rewarded w a fatal shot. The bellowin oth main body made the air tremble and frightened r d catl, while a musky odor filled the air.

The hunting ot ehe animals seemed so much like gunning for cows in a barnyard that I only metnion my exper to show how near I became lost while engaged in that misnamed sport.

Bs res hogs in liig to wallow in mud and water. With the river in sight, when thirsty we had to drink fm the little ponds where they h d been disporting, though fm its musky odor it was alm st unbearable. Still it was betern the alkali water we drank further on.

W th plain full of Bs on one side, and the island-filled P on the other, we wearily tvd on under an August sun. It was pitiful to see the sufferg oth oxen, as w tongues lollg out an eyes turned appealingly to the brutish driver, they slowly moved along. Soti they were lashed, beaten and overrkd until they fell dead in their tracks. .
